Walford made it a double with the second eight event.

The boys' first eight was a closer race for most of the 2000m, with St Peters and Scotch in hot pursuit of the PAC crew which had obtained a good break with a fast. clean start.

PAC's narrow lead gradually increased, with a pacy 35 strokes/minute rate.

This was the fourth win for PAC in six years but the first victory for debut coach, Moscow Olympic rower John Bolt, whose son, Matt, was in the winning crew.
